

INTRODUCTION

Fèis Rois is committed to ensuring that its programme of work is inclusive and accessible to everyone.

Fèis Rois aims to:

- Advance equality of opportunity between people who share a protected characteristic and those who do not.
- Foster good relations between people who share a protected characteristic and those who do not.
- Minimise disadvantages suffered by people due to their protected characteristic by removing any barriers to participation.
- Meet the needs of people from protected groups where these are different from the needs of other people through, in some cases, targeted activities.
- Encourage people from protected groups to participate in traditional music and Gaelic language activities.

Fèis Rois acknowledges that there is compelling evidence showing that organisations that embrace Equalities, Diversity and Inclusion (EDI) are more successful creatively, recognising the rich artistic and creative opportunities that diversity and inclusion offers, as well as being more economically viable and sustainable.

There is also a legislative duty to eliminate discrimination, advance equality of opportunity and foster good relations. This EDI Action Plan should be read alongside the Fèis Rois EDI Policy.

VISION STATEMENT

Fèis Rois wants to see a Scotland that nurtures, values, and celebrates traditional music and the Gaelic language at home and around the world, and we will create transformative opportunities for people of all ages to engage with traditional music and the Gaelic language.

In the context of EDI, Fèis Rois believes that everyone who wants to engage with traditional music, Gaelic language and culture should have the opportunity to do so regardless of age, disability, ethnicity, race, faith or belief, sex, gender identity, sexual orientation, education, socioeconomic background, or caring responsibilities.

ACCESS AND INCLUSION FOR ALL

Fèis Rois will achieve its aims around equalities, diversity and inclusion by removing barriers to participation, working collaboratively with partners and, where appropriate, delivering targeted programmes of work.

Through the proposed programme of activity for the period 2025 to 2028, Fèis Rois will continue to provide opportunities for people who identify as neurodivergent, experience poor health, come from a disadvantaged socio-economic background, have grown up in the care system,

have experience of being carers, are Gaelic speakers, do not speak English as a primary language, have experience of displacement, or who live in geographic locations which may inhibit opportunities for engagement.

We understand that intersectionality means that certain individuals can face multiple layers of disadvantage and discrimination due to their characteristics and social backgrounds, and we will work hard to remove barriers and improve inclusion and accessibility for everyone.

During the period 2025 to 2028, Fèis Rois is making the following EDI commitments.

More detail is given in the EDI objectives table below.

- Issuing an access rider document to all freelance musicians and creative practitioners contracted to work for Fèis Rois (See Appendix A)
- Using anonymised evaluation forms to monitor who is participating in our events and using this information to target people who are missing from our programme in future sessions / years.
- Ensuring that programmed activity takes place in accessible venues and, where
 possible, considering the lighting, availability of gender-neutral toilets, baby changing
 facilities, parking, access to public transport, etc, etc.
- Providing clearer information about the venues used for Fèis Rois activity on the organisation's website.
- · Including quiet spaces at Fèis Rois events.
- Recognising that different people have different styles of learning, and adapting accordingly to ensure that everyone is included.
- Having a "pay what you can" system for some courses where it is clearly stated that this
 might mean that you can pay nothing, and that is okay.
- Offering free after school music making opportunities in four communities across Ross-Shire, including in SIMD 1 & 2 areas and in rural communities.
- Providing an access budget to widen participation.
- Arranging transport to some events as travel can be a major barrier to participation in the Highlands.
- Offering translation services to enable New Scots to take part in programmed activities.
- Offering a wider range of times for weekly music-making workshops so that a wider range of people can access them.
- Continuing to adapt the Ceilidh Trail project to include learning disabled artists.
- Developing bespoke programmes of work to meet the individual needs of care experienced young people.
- Increasing the visibility of LGBTQ+ and disabled people within our organisation so others feel welcomed in.
- Continue to improve the accessibility of the Fèis Rois website and anything posted online, e.g. using +ALT text when posting images online.

TARGETED PROGRAMME

During the period 2025 to 2028, Fèis Rois will deliver creative projects that actively support people with the following Protected Characteristics:

- 1. Age
- 2. Disability
- 3. Sex
- 4. Sexual Orientation
- 5. Race

Furthermore, acknowledging the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic and the current cost-of-living crisis, another area of focus will be to provide opportunities for people living in areas of socio-economic deprivation in the Highlands.

Given the nature of Fèis Rois' work and recognising that UNESCO lists the Gaelic language as "definitely endangered," another area of focus for this EDI plan is to support Gaelic speakers, fluent and learners, to engage with the language creatively through music and the arts.

Fèis Rois will also help to deliver Scotland's promise to its children and young people. The Promise (with cross-party support, and national and local government commitment) is that every child will grow up loved, safe and respected by 2030. Fèis Rois will contribute to this through a programme of work for **Care Experienced Young People** in the Highlands. See: https://thepromise.scot/

As a care experienced person Fèis Rois has always been there even when we experience moves all the time and they are able to accommodate us not matter where we are in Scotland, which has been amazing because it means I can still have my lessons even if it's over Zoom for a while.

Fèis Rois is amazing and are catering for anyone no matter who they are or what they are going through. I'm so grateful for everything Fèis Rois has done for me so far and I look forward to more exciting opportunities to come.

Fèis Rois staff will be required to undertake EDI training annually. This could be, but is not restricted to, Disability Equality Training, LGBTQ+ awareness training, mental health first aid, managing challenging behaviour in education settings, and autism awareness training.

FINANCE

Fèis Rois budgets separately for staff training and for tutor training. This allows the organisation to meet the needs of its freelance artists and staff depending on the settings in which they are working and their individual development needs.

MONITORING

We acknowledge that we live in an ever-changing landscape, and we will endeavour to be at the forefront of good practice when it comes to equalities, diversity and inclusion.

Fèis Rois is confident that it has set deliverable EDI objectives and therefore identifies all of its EDI objectives as being LOW RISK.

The Fèis Rois EDI Plan is a standing item on the agenda at all quarterly Board meetings. The Board will look at the actual performance to date and be able to see quickly and clearly if there are any risks to the successful delivery of this plan.

It seems appropriate to mention the Board of Fèis Rois within the context of this plan. Our commitment to EDI also informs our governance structure. Both the Chief Executive and the Chair of Fèis Rois are women. In April 2024, of the 12 Directors / Trustees on the Board of Fèis Rois, 6 are Gaelic speakers, 2 are under the age of 25, 6 are former participants of Fèis Rois, and freelance artists and disabled artists are represented on the Board.

ACCESS RIDER ADVICE AND TEMPLATE

At Fèis Rois, we are committed to being an equal opportunities employer and, as far as is reasonably possible, we will put in place measures to support all artists and musicians to be able to work with us.

A rider is a set of requests that an artist or musician supplies to a venue or organisation ahead of a gig, session or engagement and the requests are usually fulfilled by the venue or organisation. They are used by artists all the time so everyone knows what they need to provide the artist so that person can do their job.

An access rider is a document that details your access needs. Access riders are used by disabled artists to ensure that their access needs are met so they can do their job. Conversations about access can be difficult and some people struggle to communicate their needs fully. An access rider is an easy way to clearly communicate your access needs to anyone that you're working with, and start a conversation about what you need to do your job. Using an access rider can help everyone feel confident in their working relationships with each other.

You can provide an access rider after you've been booked to make sure that any conversations about your access needs happen early on, that way everyone knows what to expect and can make sure everything is in place before you begin work. Once you have your own access rider, you can tweak it for whatever situation you're working in.

The most effective access riders are specific, and use bullet points and headings to cover different aspects and timings of your work. The most important thing when creating your access rider is to make sure it gives a clear picture of your requirements.

What to consider when writing your access rider:

- What access issues have I experienced before and am likely to experience again?
- How have these issues been solved?
- What are my access requirements for online events and or meetings?
- Are any of my access needs negotiable?
- Is everyone familiar with the technology I use or require?

Some examples of requests we have had from musicians working on residential courses for Fèis Rois, include:

- I need accessible teaching spaces and overnight accommodation. For example, my
 classroom must be on the ground floor or have lift access. I need a wet room / shower that is
 on the ground with no lip into it and not over a bath.
- I need help to carry my instrument from my car to the teaching space.
- I deal with chronic pain in the early mornings so prefer to teach only in the afternoons and evenings.

- 3. Introduction
- 4. My Access Needs
- 5. Emergency Contact Details
- 6. Any Further Information

Introduction

Here you can write a brief introductory paragraph about you and your work / arts practice / music. You can also write about your condition if you wish to disclose that and how it affects you. You should list the things that are essential to understanding how to work with you.

E.g., I am a musician. I spend much of my week teaching and I often gig at the weekend. I have a condition that affects my energy levels and causes chronic pain. My condition is exacerbated by stress, dehydration and overexertion. My condition can change rapidly day to day and even hour to hour, I will be sure to communicate clearly with the team about how I'm feeling.

My Access Needs

Here you can outline your main access needs. You can also separate them into sections according to different aspects of your work.

Emergency Information

Here you can write what should happen in the case of an emergency and who to contact.

Any Further Information

The Impact of Fèis Rois on the Mental Health of Residents

The relationship between Catalina House and Fèis Rois has been one of absolute celebration.

The impact of Fèis Rois on the totality of mental health care provision in Catalina has been profoundly significant and transformative with qualitative data revealing a multiplicity of positive and developmental outcomes for residents as well as providing life enrichment.

Several of the residents participate in weekly music lessons and group sessions which has resulted in feelings of improved self-worth; self-esteem; self-confidence and indeed self-actualization (ref: Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs, the Study of Positive Human Qualities,1943). One can also refer to the correlation with the National Health & Social Care Standards that are underpinned by the 5 principles of Dignity and Respect; Compassion; Be Included; Responsive Care and Support and Wellbeing.

One young resident who has experienced life significant trauma has created his own care plan entitled 'Untying the Knot'; this care plan was created by this resident as a direct result of his involvement in weekly drumming lessons with Fèis Rois and describes the release of mental strain and negative thought disturbance that are re-channelled via the rhythm and beat of the drum sessions. This resident has also created and written his own song based on the emotional connection with his place of birth in Scotland.

Other residents involved in music lessons have spoken about life skills development and the enjoyment of learning to play the guitar. The impact of Fèis Rois has had a tangible and emollient effect on residents' mental functionality, indeed two parents have referred to their daughter as having a renewed sense of purpose in life.

The initial Ceilidh in September 2023 was attended by many residents and family members and was regarded as a truly joyous occasion providing musical stimulation and collective merriment. The feedback from residents was exemplary and we are looking forward to the next Ceilidh. The partnership with Fèis Rois has embarked Catalina House on a new trajectory and journey where the positive influence on individuals' mental health has been observable and demonstrable. In certain individuals, their levels of apathy and disinterest have been replaced with re-motivation and personal goals and aspirations. In other individuals in Catalina, the team has noted a reduction in low mood manifestation, levels of anxiety and deep-rooted depression.

In summary, the role and impact of working in partnership with Fèis Rois has been of substantial benefit to residents with enduring mental health problems and associated symptomology. One resident can be regularly heard practicing the guitar in her room – again this is a direct result of her participation in weekly guitar lessons and sessions with Fèis Rois.
